
Ours is a parish within whose “walls” we can grow spiritually, socially, intellectually and psychologically. Within

Fellowship Sunday was September 25th -- it was an opportunity for us to welcome new members to our parish, get to know current members better, learn about our parish ministries, upcoming events and how we can get involved. The many ministries of our church give all of us lots and lots of opportunities to use the gifts God has given us.

In His ministry, Christ shows us how to use the gifts He gave us: He healed, He taught, He fed people with five loaves and two fish, He offered His body and blood to His disciples and He constantly served the people around Him.

Our ministries at church reflect what Christ teaches us about stewardship—we are caring for each other's needs—those within the church and those in the larger community. We have people in our parish who offer their

talent of healing. We teach Religious Education to our children and adults. We teach the hymns and chants of our church. We feed people through our donations to Outreach, Family Sharing and to Philoptochos. We offer ourselves and serve the church with our time and our resources.

And in that service to the church we build relationships. For myself, I have many friendships and “koumbari-ships” that have been nurtured here at church as we work side by side at Festival, sing next to each other in choir, or sit together at coffee hour. I am blessed to be a part of this community; it has provided me with so much.

And since this church has given me so much over the years, it's important to me to give back to the church, to offer my stewardship, part of which is financial. Over

the years, I have come to understand that if we are to continue all of our wonderful ministries here at Holy Cross we need to support those ministries by supporting the church. This is not to say I am a good giver. I have struggled between how much is enough and what I am asked to give. We are asked to tithe—I am not there yet. And for years, I told myself that \$100 a month was pretty good but as I have grown in my understanding—I am slowly pushing myself towards tithing. Recently, I read about an idea - 10 for 10, to reach 10% in 10 years. Currently I am at 2% of my income and each year I will increase a percent.

A favorite parable is the Parable of the Talents. One of the reasons I like this parable is it just fascinates me that *talent*, the word for currency in ancient Rome and Greece, came to mean a skill or ability that one possesses, **talent is value**—I think sometimes we take

our talent for granted and don't realize how valuable our different talents are. In the parable, two of the three servants, doubled the talents the master had given them. The master rewarded them, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have been faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things. Enter into the joy of your lord." But unfortunately, one servant buried the talent that was given to him and that really didn't work out for him at all—he was cast into the outer darkness. (Matthew 25:14-30)



SAINT JOHN CHRYSOSTOM ORATORICAL FESTIVAL

The 2017 Saint John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival Topics have been released, and we are beginning preparations for the Holy Cross Parish Festival which will be held on **Sunday, February 5**. This gives our youth plenty of time to pull out their Bibles, sharpen their pencils, and reflect on their Orthodox Faith!

The Saint John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival is an Archdiocese-wide ministry which gives Orthodox youth an opportunity to write and deliver an oral presentation about their faith. For our Parish Festival, there will be three divisions. Our Elementary (grades 4-6) Division participants may choose any topic on Orthodoxy they wish, and their speeches are not judged. Junior (grades 7-9) and Senior (grades 10-12) Division participants must write a speech about one of the topics provided. This year the topics are:

Junior Division (1) The opening petition of the Divine Liturgy is “In peace let us pray to the Lord.” What is this peace, and why do we need it to begin our prayers? (2) St. John Chrysostom said, “Our alms are judged not by the measure of our gifts, but by the largeness of our mind”. Discuss how even small acts of kindness and generosity can make a difference. (3) Discuss the role of bread and its symbolism in the Bible and the life of the Church. (4) The Orthodox Church venerates saints and martyrs every day. Talk about a saint whose life inspires you to be a better Orthodox Christian. (5) Explain why

the Orthodox Church focuses more on the resurrection than it does on the passion and suffering of Christ.

Senior Division (1) The gap between the rich and poor in the United States and worldwide is arguably wider than it has ever been. How should we as Orthodox Christians address such terrible inequality? (2) Although many people diet for health or vanity, the discipline of fasting is found in many religious traditions. What is the difference between dieting and fasting, and why is it important? (3) Psalms are an integral part of matins, vespers, and many other church services. Talk about a psalm that impacts or influences your life. (4) The Lord commanded us not to create idols (Exodus 20:4), yet people continue to do so. Discuss the kinds of idols people make or worship today and the response that an Orthodox Christian should have when confronted by them. (5) Jesus said, “Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar’s, and to God the things that are God’s” (Matthew 22:21). When no political party represents genuine Christian teaching, how does an Orthodox Christian navigate political conversations and make political judgments?

The Oratorical Festival provides an opportunity for our youth to gain experience in public speaking within the supportive environment of our Church, and it provides them with the opportunity for personal

reflection on their faith and the chance to share it with others. Please encourage the young people in your life to participate in this thought-provoking and inspiring ministry.

Kostas! We were so happy to see everyone there!



quiet feast by konstantine salmas, lay assistant

The quiet feel of the fifth floor balcony was part of a choice. I picked a quiet area on purpose. I wanted boring to be available. It was a quiet that occurs quickly in Greek neighborhoods. A few steps can sometimes lead quickly into subterranean silence, people and moving vehicles gone. I looked over my hotel balcony. No cars drove down this street, even though it was a right turn from the acropolis museum.

I prioritized Athens for Koimosis. They removed scaffolding from the outside and the inside of the cathedral church in the spring. This is where I wanted to be to celebrate koimosis for vespers and for liturgy in the morning. I had attended services in kolonaki. That is where they had moved the Mitropolis services, until very recently. Before that, I remember watching Liturgy on

television. I watched on Saturday night when they were celebrating in Athens at Mitropolis.

This summer, for the feast, I liked being in a church where I recognized the priests and chanters which I had watched from television, at home. It was a connection to Belmont, and in that Athens quiet, I appreciated this connection. The Vespers was low key, attended by a few people. Tourists stood in back, by the open large doors. They stood in pools, looking at the cleared out and cleaned up interior. Then, they walked outside to find dinner or face the stores of Plaka and Monastiraki.

The priest announced an early time for Liturgy in the morning. Orthros began around quarter of seven. I returned that evening to the balcony quiet of the neighborhood. Camp

played in my mind, teenagers moving in groups led by the staff. My brain fired off the continuous sounds of an Ionian Village summer, there on the fifth floor hotel balcony.

It was a five minute walk to Liturgy. A lot of activity hadn't yet moved into the early morning. Liturgy was nearly as low key as vespers. The people in the first couple of rows knew each other. They looked happy to be in their church, again, during a service. We all could have been in a church in a smaller town or a village. The chanting wasn't particularly embellished. Like here, like in any Greek Orthodox church, the people knew what to expect. Koimosis Liturgy went according to plan and, after a strong coffee, I returned to the long established quiet of those neighborhood streets.

The Feast of the Dormition of our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary is celebrated on August 15 each year. The Feast commemorates the repose (dormition, or in Greek, *kimisis*) or "falling asleep" of the Mother of Jesus Christ, our Lord. The Feast also commemorates the translation or assumption into heaven of the body of the Theotokos.

FROM THE JANITOR'S CLOSET

The door to my closet was closed. I just came back from attending my aunt's funeral in L.A. I was thinking about the funeral and the difference in the way the two churches raised money to meet their operating expenses.

How do we meet Holy Cross' operating expenses? WE DON'T! We use a Fair Share system, we have donations, we have the Festival, and we still do not meet our operating expenses.

Fair Share or tithing should be 10%. How about SUPPORTING OUR CHURCH? Let's try it!

We SUPPORT many things mainly for our self-satisfaction: (1) Sports events (2) Our favorite grocery store. (3) Movies and many other things.

These are just a few of the things we support. Every time we spend money we are supporting someone or an organization.

We, as a family, have always supported our church, whether our children were in church or going to college or working many miles away like all my children did at one time or another. It was important to us that the Parish as a community and the Priests could do the job of teaching the right way of life for

all of us. We should, all of us, support the church and the Parish, presently and for future generations.

Here is another way of supporting the church; one of many. As I said, I recently went to Saint Sofia to attend my aunt's funeral. After the service, we went to the hall (the room was bigger than The Oaks but smaller than our Main Hall). There were approximately 50 people for a buffet lunch. The lunch was a two-inch square piece of cod, rice, string beans, and salad. I had to put the string beans over the rice to make the rice palatable. The lunch was rated a "C-" by all my cousins who were there.

After lunch, I had a chance to ask my cousin what the *makaria* cost. I was astonished when he told me the lunch cost \$46.50 per plate and he was charged for 125 lunches that they mistakenly over-ordered. Then the real

shocker -- the church charged him \$1600 for the room.

What do we get for supporting Holy Cross? When we lose a loved one and we have a traditional service and *makaria*, The Oaks or the Main Hall is free, and the food costs are held down. This is just one of many benefits we enjoy by SUPPORTING HOLY CROSS and there are many more. Of course, the donation for the use of the Hall is up to you.

Tithing is a 10% gig. **SUPPORTING THE PARISH IS AN ALL-YOU-CAN-GIVE GIG.**

Where else can you go where "Everyone knows your name and are glad to see you"? You could go to Cheers but that would be a waste of time and money.

In response to a need expressed by members of our Orthodox Christian community, the International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) was established in 1992 as the official international humanitarian relief and development agency of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of North and Central America.

Since its inception, IOCC has distributed \$580 million in emergency relief and development assistance to families and communities in more than 50 countries. IOCC does not provide funds for Church missions such as religious education or missionary work. All funds collected by the agency (minus administrative expenses) are instead used for humanitarian aid. All assistance is provided solely on the basis of need, and benefits families, refugees and displaced persons, the elderly, school children, orphans, and people with disabilities.


