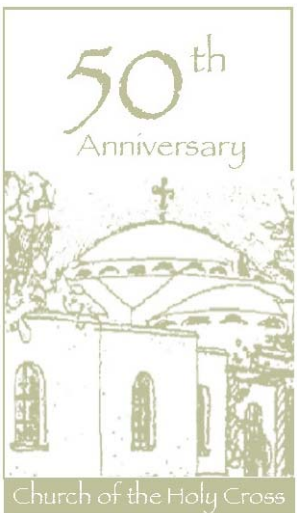

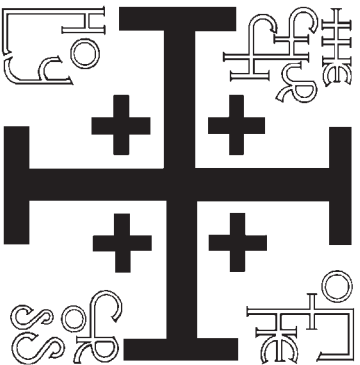
## Our Family and our Relationship with God

We, as Orthodox Christians, are indeed fortunate to have many opportunities to begin anew to right the wrongs, to have the often critical “second chance” and get back on the right path. That we should have a second go of things, is a refrain that may spring from many lips, and, fortunately, we, as Orthodox Christians, are able to rethink, repent, and begin anew.

Resolutions that outline a new plan for personal and worldly stability often neglect the more weighty matters of spiritual growth and Christian mentoring. We take for granted our relationship with God because many of us, and I draw upon my conversations with many, think that God’s love and concern is a given and He will understand ‘because I believe in Him, He is my Lord and Savior’. Yet we all know

that a relationship that is marked by an occasional talk and perfunctory action bears no fruit and offers little if any solace when needed.

I submit to you that our lives need a more focused approach to living the kind of life that is in keeping with our Lord’s teaching. Simply acknowledging the presence of God in our lives is of little value when we spend all of our time securing our present and future but only in the material and immediate emotional sense.

Our children learn from us...and pick up both our good and bad attitudes, actions, and habits. Take a moment to observe your children and you will learn many things about yourself that you mistakenly thought you had outgrown. The opportunity to reform and reshape our focus is not easy and requires our commitment and time, but the opportunity should not be ignored.

I am always dismayed and terribly disappointed when Greek Orthodox families find other things to do on Sunday mornings. When we take Sunday, the Lord’s Day, and turn it into a day of sports we are teaching our children that the worship of God is not as important as the worship of man and what we can achieve by ourselves. It is the “fall of Adam” repackaged. Make 2006 a year where your time with family begins with the joining together in communal prayer and an active participation in the Divine Liturgy on a weekly basis. Encourage regular participation in the Religious Education classes offered weekly following Holy Communion. Be prepared to receive Holy Communion with your family at least twice per month if not weekly. The early Christians, the Apostolic Christians as described to us by Saint Paul, received daily when they met in homes. We have pulled away and neglected this most important aspect of our spiritual growth. And if we have not been to Holy Confession in recent memory then we should make time to contemplate and offer our confession as we embark on this renewed spiritual journey.

Yes, the early years of a child’s life are very important and a time when many opportunities to develop skills and talents are available to us. Yet, somehow we have developed this thought that the things of God will take care of themselves and so we must focus on the things of man. We do our children and grandchildren such a disservice

when we encourage their physical and intellectual development but neglect the weightier matters of the soul.

GK Chesterton in his concluding remarks on Charles Dickens also says the following that is noteworthy for our time :

*“There is, going along side by side with that puritan movement in modern times, a very dangerous pagan movement as well. There is a very real danger, particularly among the luxurious classes in America—of becoming absolutely heartless and riotous in their indulgence in the pleasures of life.”*

We indulge ourselves and our children much too much. A return to a more sane and insightful approach to our daily existence is in order and begins in the home. It is in the home that the lessons and instructions that come from our Lord and His church are put into play and encouraged.

This year has been designated the “Year of the Family.” As we celebrate the 50th Anniversary of Holy Cross as a parish community let us also embrace this designation and place our families firmly on the road that leads to Christ. A restructuring of our daily schedule to include the commemoration of the saints and feast days will help in placing Christ at our center and the life of the church as our lifestyle.

May this new year be filled with good health, spiritual growth, and mark the full practice of our faith in Christ Jesus our Lord. *Chronia Polla.*

# STEWARDSHIP 2006

## “Bearing Fruit: Witness and Service”

Throughout 2006, we are asked to keep in mind the above campaign pledge in terms of our individual stewardship as Orthodox Christians. Yet these very simple words, familiar to even the youngest students in religious education classes, have a world of meaning behind them.



Start with the phrase “bearing fruit”: throughout the Bible there are references to the importance of fruit-bearing vines, the diligence required in their care, and the punishment and disgrace of a barren fig tree. Scripture likens us to the fruit:

*I am the vine, you are the branches: he that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing... Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples*  
John 15:5,8

*The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.*  
Galatians 5:22,23

These nine traits, governing our thoughts and day-to-day activities, would show the world through our actions that we are dedicated followers of Christ. And that is exactly what “witness” (both a noun and a verb) means:

**Witness:** n. *one who can give a firsthand account of something seen, heard, or experienced; one who is called on to testify before a court or signs one's name to a document for the purpose of attesting to its authenticity; one who publicly affirms religious faith*

**Witness:** v. *to provide or serve as evidence of; to testify*

Even a young child understands that “actions speak louder than words”; being a “witness” to your beliefs by reflecting love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control shows the world who we believe in better than corner soapboxes or newsletter articles or crucifixes worn around our necks.

And the second part of our pledge is “service” – the giving of our time and our talent and our treasure as we care for the world, community, church, and families entrusted to our “temporary custody” or stewardship during our relatively short sojourn on this earth.

During 2006, when we feel stretched and stressed and wanting control, may we remember that God, because of His gift to us of freewill, gives us control over ourselves.

## MEMORY LANE 2 -- 50 YEARS AGO

The Church of the Holy Cross is the first Greek Orthodox parish established on the Peninsula. In June of 1955, Sunday School was established with 28 children enrolled. Teaching facilities at the Shoreview Methodist Church in San Mateo were arranged.

On January 25, 1956, Bishop Demetrios, head of the Western States Diocese of the Greek Orthodox Church, accompanied by priests from surrounding parishes, addressed the first general assembly held at the IOOF Hall in San Mateo. 110 people attended this meeting at which a formal petition was prepared and sent to the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese in New York requesting a religious charter.

Archbishop Michael formally recognized “The Greek Orthodox Church of San Mateo County” as a parish of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of North and South America on March 13, 1956. Bishop Demetrios assigned Father Stanley Marcantonis (September 1956 - March 1957) as the first pastor. The use of the IOOF Hall was obtained for church services and Sunday School activities. The first Divine Liturgy was celebrated on Sunday, September 14, 1956, the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, at the IOOF Hall.

Watch for this column on succeeding months as the development of the Holy Cross Church Community continues to unfold.

## WHAT'S WITH THAT?

I need to take another shot at the commercialism of Christmas! Everyone knows about “Black Friday”, the shop-‘til-you-drop day. Stores open at midnight and some close at midnight. On that day, retailers in North America made \$4.8 billion. That’s right -- that was with a “B” for “Billions”. The retailers said their expectations were off by 1%. So, you do the math! For the whole Christmas Season (whoops, sorry, I said the “C “ word; I should have said the “Holiday Season”), they’re expecting to rake in \$440 billion.

It occurred to me (and I hope to you too) that with that kind of money, we sure could put a big dent in world hunger, poverty and take care of many of the world’s health problems. ## SELL OR BUY

The Kingdom of Heaven parables explain what is involved in righteousness before God. They explain what is happening during the situation of a person’s life when God becomes a desired reference point. Matthew 13 lists several of these parables in a row. The first parable is the parable of the Sower. After this parable, Christ lays out several explanations of the kingdom of heaven. We will look at one: “The Kingdom of Heaven is like a treasure hidden in the field, which a man

found and hid, and for joy of it goes and sells all he has and buys that field.” The man is paying attention to something else and then he finds the treasure. Whatever the circumstances are that have determined his situation, when he encounters the treasure, he is impacted. The treasure causes a stir and presents him with a situation. The parable implies that a person cannot have the found treasure and the things he already has. Circumstance calls for an extreme decision in order to keep the treasure. “For joy of it, he goes and sells all he has and buys that field.” He really wants the treasure and, with joy, he sells what he has so



he can buy the field that houses the treasure. This parable definitely shows the kingdom of heaven to be something of such great value that a person wants to give up other things in order to have it. The kingdom, the treasure, causes the ramifications of this treasure on the man’s life to show themselves. The faith of the man had to be demonstrated in order to possess the treasure and the action was something he did with joy. The movement was extreme — he sold all he had so he could have the treasure — but he wanted to do it.

The effect of the kingdom of heaven on a person is dramatic. The Divine Liturgy is a display of the kingdom of heaven because, in his desire for the kingdom of heaven, Christ is constantly acting in a way that is drastic in relation to the rest of society, but also drastic in a way that mirrors acts of righteous men over the course of Scripture. He moves towards the kingdom and there, at the cross, the kingdom waits.

The Christian cross is meant to be a sign of the power of God’s kingdom. The life of Christ is a display of this power, but a power displayed most perfectly by his humility to the Father. The kingdom of

heaven parables put forth that what is involved in righteousness before God is a drastic move on our part out of joy. We don't have to sell all we have, but the action of the man should be an indication to us that God means business when it comes to the seriousness of salvation in Jesus Christ, the seriousness of this Christian message.

### STEVE CARDIASMENOS TO RECEIVE AXION AWARD

This year, our choir director, **Steve Cardiasmenos**, is the winner of the prestigious "Axion Award," which is the highest honor bestowed by the Hellenic American Professional Society. This award honors outstanding persons of Hellenic ancestry who have demonstrated leadership, have made a significant achievement in a professional field, and have made a contribution to the Hellenic community or to society in general.

Steve received this award because of his outstanding contributions to the field of music. He composes, conducts, sings, chants, teaches and plays numerous musical instruments. He has played woodwind instruments since he was five years old and completed his first composition at the age of fifteen. Since then, his musical compositions and arrangements number well over 500! Steve also



started conducting at the age of fifteen. In the 1970's he served as Assistant Director, under Perecles Phillips, of the Ascension Liturgical Choir in Oakland. He has been the Choir Director at Holy Cross since 1985, and has conducted large religious and secular choral groups and orchestras.

We are truly privileged to hear his brilliant compositions in our church, such as his version of **The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom**, **The Presanctified Liturgy**, "Praise the Lord" for combined adult and youth choirs, "The Rich are Destitute" in English and Greek, "Lord I Cry Unto You", "Jesus is the Resurrection", "Unto the Lord do I Lift up my Soul", "Cherubic Hymn" in English, "Holy God", "Christ is Risen", "Theos Kirios", and "Evlogimenos O Erhomenos".

Steve received many awards for his musical accomplishments. His Greek Orthodox awards include the "Saint Romanos the Melodist Medallion," which is the Archdiocese's and the National Forum's highest musical honor; the "Patriarch Athenagoras Distinguished Service Medallion," and the "Saint John the Damascene and Saint Kosmas the Melodist Award." For his secular music contributions, he has received a special composition award, each year for the past 13 years, from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP). These awards were given to Steve in honor of his compositions in choral music, pop music and jazz.

Steve's contributions to the wider community are well known to many of us. He was the Assistant Conductor of the Masterworks Chorale and Orchestra, a 180-voice chorale and professional orchestra based in San Mateo. The Masterworks Chorale regularly performed throughout the Bay Area and made many guest appearances with major symphony orchestras in the Bay Area and at leading musical festivals at Carnegie Hall and on European and Far Eastern tours. It has been described as "one of the finest large choruses in the nation". He presently sings tenor in *Sine Nomine*, a 30-voice choral group based in San Mateo, and he continues to perform regularly in musical groups, playing woodwind instruments, piano and organ. Furthermore, Steve is very active in the musical programs of the local public schools. He has written special compositions for the bands and orchestras of the San

Carlos and Belmont schools. His most recent contribution was to the Belmont public school's "Save the Music" fundraiser project. For this program he composed a very beautiful and rousing choral piece named "Save the Music". Our Belmont church choir joined choral groups from many local schools and church choirs to sing this song. Steve conducted the combined groups of 100+ singers at the fundraiser, which was held in Redwood Shores on October 3 of 2004. The fundraiser was very successful, netting over \$350,000. As a result the grade-school musical programs in the Belmont schools were restored!

Steve has been blessed with a wonderful family, his wife, **Leslie**, and their two children, **Andrew** and **Kristen**. They are all talented musicians!

The awards luncheon will be held on Greek Letters Day, **Sunday, February 12**, in The Oaks following the Liturgy. Let's all be there to honor Steve!

There is a list of a dozen or so guidelines on the back of the “**FACILITIES**” form which must be followed so that the church facilities remain open and available for all parishioners. ***Principal among these rules is that*** no meeting of any kind may take place while a church service is occurring. Also, please remember, that since we do not have a night custodian, ALL meetings scheduled for the evenings, MUST be on the church calendar -- otherwise, we will not have the room(s) available or the door(s) open for your group.

## A FEW THOUGHTS AT THE BEGINNING OF THE YEAR

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! I trust everyone had a great Christmas together with the whole family and friends as it is the Christmas tradition. As we enter the 2006 there is one event that we should pay attention to and also to be proud of. It is the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Church of the Holy Cross. And you may want to know that here at Holy Cross we prepare ourselves accordingly to this great event in the life of our community and family. There is a committee that's working hard to put together all the events for 2006 and all is culminating with the Golden Gala Ball on **December 29**. So probably during this 2006 year you may be asked to support, help and participate in those events in order to make this 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary a really "golden" one.

Since this edition of *Cross Currents* will be available for you during the post-feast of Theophany, I thought that this would be a good subject to talk about. *Theophany*, is the manifestation, the showing forth of God in His Fullness! Christ's baptism in the Jordan is a manifestation of God to the world for two reasons. First, it is the beginning of our Lord's public ministry. Secondly, Epiphany is the manifestation of God because it was at the baptism of Jesus that all three Persons of the Holy Trinity appeared together for the first time. The Father's voice testified from on high to the divine Sonship of Jesus. The Son accepted His Father's testimony, and the Holy Spirit was seen descending from the Father in the form of a dove and resting upon the Son (Matt. 3:16).

God — Father, Son and Holy Spirit — plays an important role in the life and worship of the Orthodox Christian. We are baptized in the name of the Trinity; we are forgiven in the name of the Trinity; we are married in the name of the Trinity; every liturgy begins with the name of the Trinity. The doctrine of the Trinity was not dropped from heaven by God. In fact, the word Trinity is never even mentioned in the Scriptures. It came from the way the early Christians experienced God. It was an experience before it ever became a doctrine. The doctrine was an intellectual expression of what the early Christians found to be compellingly real in their own lives.

There are people who will say, "The Trinity -- that's a little too complicated for me. I want a simple God, a God I can understand." Well, we shall never be able to understand God completely. This is the reason we cannot understand the Trinity. This is not to say, however, that we cannot express the Trinity in a way that is simple to understand. The Trinity means that I believe in God the Father Who made me, God the Son Who saves me, God the Holy Spirit Who lives in me. God the Father: for us in love eternally! God the Son: with us in grace, historically, but also eternally! God the Holy Spirit: in us in power, experientially, historically, and eternally! God the Father: God above me. God the Son: God beside me. God the Holy Spirit: God within me and within the Church.

Throughout history many analogies have been used to try to help us understand how God can be three Persons, yet one God. None of these analogies is perfect, yet each helps cast some light on the mystery. For example, water has three forms: solid (ice), liquid (water), and vapor (steam), yet its chemical composition does not change; it remains one. The sun is composed of heat, gas, and a gigantic mass of matter; yet it is one. These analogies are but weak human efforts to try to understand the infinite God. Immanuel Kant said once that there are limitations to our finite minds and that with these limitations we can *contemplate* but not *engulf* things that are infinite. When we come into the presence of God, we do not understand; rather, we bow in awe and cover our eyes, for His brilliance is so great as to be blinding.

I will end this article with this prayer addressed to the Holy Trinity :

*My hope is in the Father;  
My refuge is in the Son;  
My shelter is in the Holy Spirit;  
Holy Trinity, glory to You.*

May our good and loving God help us to meet with each and everyone of you during the events planned to honor the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary!
